Broad investment in our youth, development of community pride, increase overall achievement, encouragement of positive expression, and development of leadership skills



Who We Serve


- Students ages 10 to 17

In-School Enrichment Programs

"Positive youth development programs strengthen young people's sense of identity, belief in the future, self-regulation, and self-efficacy as well as their social, emotional, cognitive, and behavioral competence" - Centers for Disease Control

According to Youth.gov:

- Youth enrichment programs often provide the skills and education not normally included in the school curriculum
- These programs have the potential to prevent substance abuse and violence that contribute to risky behaviors and are associated with improvements in academic performance
- Afterschool programs support social, emotional, cognitive, and academic development, reduce risky behaviors, promote physical health, and provide a safe and supportive environment for children and youth

In-School Programs are FREE and open to ALL Fort Bend County Schools -Sessions meet once a week -8 to 10 on campus sessions



Leadership Program



Anti-Bullying Program


This program provides the students with the education to help raise awareness to the risks of bullying and create effective solutions

EEYP Leadership Program

- FBISD Willowridge High School
 - Currently on a 2-year Targeted Improvement Plan
 - Lowest graduation rate of all high schools in Fort Bend County
 - Highest percentage of economically disadvantaged students in Fort Bend County
- Students are nominated by school counselors, teachers, and administration
- Students complete the program with a resume, headshot, letter of recommendation, and professional portfolio
- Outcomes after three cycles at Willowridge High School • 90% of surveyed students feel more comfortable being a leader compared to 71% at the start of the program
 - 80% of students feel more confident with their communication skills compared to 65% at the start of the program

Youth Law Enforcement Academy

- This camp exposes youth to a variety of law enforcement careers, both general and specialized, to maintain relationships with the communities we serve and its future leaders
- Participants learn about the different law enforcement agencies to see where their interests are in the respective fields
- Creates a safe space for youth and law enforcement to interact with each other

Youth Volunteer Opportunities

"Students who perform voluntary community service were 19% more likely to graduate from college than those who did not" (Youth.gov)



- Expose Excellence has offered over 60 volunteer hours since inception
- 143 youth volunteers in the EEYP student database
- LCISD students need 100 volunteer hours for graduation cord, increasing to 160 hours for the next graduating class
- Various school clubs require members to accumulate volunteer hours
- Volunteer service is beneficial when applying for scholarships


Free Tutoring Workshops

SAT:

- Texas ranks 38th in the US for SAT scores, falling 57 points below the national average score
- COVID-19 pandemic caused average SAT scores throughout Texas to drop from the previous years
- SAT tutoring ranges from \$400 to \$800; therefore, we offer free tutoring so all students have an opportunity to benefit

STAAR:

- According to tea.texas.gov, STAAR results showed a decrease across all performance levels in 2021
- 19% of freshmen students in Fort Bend County failed the English 1 EOC
- 18% of freshmen students in Fort Bend County failed the Algebra 1 EOC



Educational Field Trips

- Outside of the confines of the classroom, educational trips provide an important opportunity for personal development
- Studies show that well-organized field trips designed to meet specific educational objectives resulted in successful cognitive, affective, and psychomotor learning outcomes (National Institute of Health)
- Another study found that regardless of gender, ethnicity or socioeconomic status, children who take school trips have better grades (59%), higher graduation rates from high school (95%) and college (63%) and greater income (12% higher annually) (U.S. Travel Association)
- 89% of surveyed adults said educational trips had a positive, lasting impact on their education and career because enriching field trips made them more engaged, intellectually curious, and interested in and out of school (U.S. Travel Association)

Expose Excellence Youth Program Juvenile Probation Department

Expose Excellence Youth Program at The Fort Bend County Juvenile Probation Department was driven by the substantial increase in serious violent crimes among the juveniles referred to the Fort Bend County Juvenile Probation Department and surrounding areas.

The basic approach of this program is meant to be a hands-on, directly involved positive presence in the schools and streets of a juvenile's community to provide a support system to youth who otherwise are surrounded by negative influences.
