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Texas Implements Voter ID Law **Thousands Attend Back-to-School Health Fair**



Now that the Supreme Court has suspended the mechanism that forced certain states to get federal preclearance before it could move forward with any election law changes, the State of Texas has begun implementing its Voter ID Law.

Under this Voter ID Law, photo identification will now be **REQUIRED** when voting in elections in Texas. The Voter ID Law was created in 2011 during the 82nd Texas Legislative Session. Texas lawmakers passed Senate Bill 14 (SB 14) creating a new requirement for voters to show photo identification when voting in person. The measure also makes voter fraud a second-degree felony punishable by as much as twenty years in prison and a possible fine of as much as \$10,000.

Soon after the new Voter ID Law was passed in 2011, the State of Texas was required to receive preclearance by the Justice Department before implementing the law. This requirement of the Justice Department stems from Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, which freezes election practices or procedures in states that have a history of voter discrimination.

Those states were then subject to review by the United States Attorney General, or could file suit before the United States District Court. Upon initial review, a federal court blocked the Texas Voter ID Law, saying the law would discriminate against low-income and minority voters. The State of Texas then made an appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

On June 25, 2013, The U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the Voting Rights Act of 1965 formula (Section 4) that decided which jurisdictions should be subject to preclearance was unconstitutional. Requests by Texas and Mississippi for

Precinct 2 Commissioner Grady Prestage, Constable Ruben Davis, City of Missouri City, other elected officials and businesses partnered with AccessHealth to ensure the Third Annual Back To School Health Fair was a success. *"The importance of an event like this health fair is to ensure the community is aware of the many services Fort Bend County provides to its residents*," says Commissioner Grady Prestage. preclearance in their Voter ID Laws were pending with the federal government when the high court struck down the constitutionality of the Act's Section 4. This then subsequently nullified Section 5, thereby giving Texas the green light to enforce the new Voter ID Law immediately.

The following documents will be accepted as a form of photo ID in the State of Texas when voting:

- Texas driver license (unexpired or expired less than 60 days)
- Texas ID (unexpired or expired less than 60 days)
- U.S. passport book/card (unexpired or expired less than 60 days)
- Texas concealed handgun license (unexpired or expired less than 60 days)
- U.S. Military ID with photo (unexpired or expired less than 60 days)
- U.S. Citizenship Certificate or Certificate of Naturalization with photo

On June 26, 2013, Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) began issuing Electronic Identification Certificates (EIC) to individuals who do not already have an acceptable form of photo identification to present when voting. Applications for the EIC will be accepted at DPS Driver License Offices in the State of Texas.

To qualify for an EIC, you must be:

- A U.S. citizen
- A Texas resident
- Eligible to vote in Texas (show a valid voter registration card or submit a voter registration application when applying for the EIC)
- 17 years and 10 months or older.
