

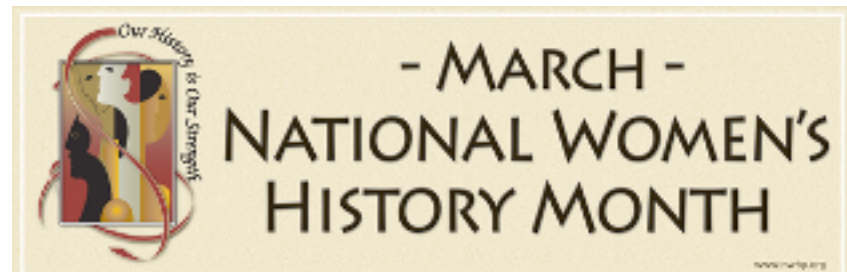

### ***Arizona Fleming***



Arizona Fleming was an African-American seamstress and owner of an undertaking company in Richmond, Texas. Fleming became part of the Civil Rights Movement in





After recent flooding, the Mayfair Park Civic Club and residents reached out to Commissioner Prestage to address concerns with the possibility of future flooding and damages. Mr. Vogler provided a detailed look into the development of Mayfair Park and what he thinks will be the best options going forward to lessen water damage or personal loss. Commissioner Prestage stayed on hand after the meeting to answer any follow up questions and reassure residents that Mayfair Park is not forgotten.

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## **Missouri City holds Second Annual 'Superhero Run'**

Jan Schiff spent her adult life working with public schools, most recently working as the Volunteer in Public Schools Coordinator for Fort Bend ISD. It was Jan's and others' vision that resulted in the creation of the Fort Bend Education Foundation in 1993, an independent organization of volunteers working to enhance the quality of public education by providing funding for grants that enrich the classroom experience. She actively pursued improving the education provided in Fort Bend ISD by participating in her children's PTOs throughout their school careers, as VIPS Coordinator, PTO President and Board member. Jan Schiff Elementary in Fort Bend Independent School District was dedicated to her and her life's work in 2008.

The CDBG funds are granted through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to assist low and moderate-income individuals by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment, and expanding economic opportunity.

Scholarships are provided as a reimbursement for qualified expenses to current Missouri City residents who are classified as low, to moderate-income and are enrolled in community college, university or vocational programs. This program is for 2016 high school graduates entering post-secondary institutions and full-time undergraduate enrollees in post-secondary institutions.

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## **Fort Bend Libraries Prepare to Celebrate 'National Library Week'**

In recognition of National Library Week, April 10-16, Fort Bend County Libraries (FBCL) joins communities around the country in celebrating the dynamic changes that are happening in today's libraries. This year's theme, "Libraries Transform," captures the evolving role of libraries as well as the difference that libraries are making in the lives of the people they serve.



After teaching for 16 years, Rita was one of three female assistant principals named in 1973. In the fall of 1974, she was named Principal of Meadows Elementary. She was the first female principal in Fort Bend ISD, and she was an advocate for individualized instruction, team teaching, and technology in the classroom. In 1992, Rita was elected to the Fort Bend ISD Board of Trustees, where she served three terms. Her stability and her commitment to education and educators helped to guide the district through a period of rapid growth and change. Throughout her roles as a Teacher, Principal, Curriculum Director, and Board member, Rita Drabek has maintained her commitment to quality education for all children in our community. As a role model and mentor, her influence will be felt for years to come.

In the 68 years since the Fort Bend County Library system was founded, libraries have become more than just books, card catalogs, and a quiet place of study. Today's Libraries embrace technology and online access to digital media such as ebooks, music and streamed movies, while maintaining their connection to the traditional library experience.

In 2015, library patrons checked out more than 3.3-million physical books, DVDs and CDs, while others adopted the newer digital format, downloading more than 111,000 audiobooks and e-books from the libraries' online offerings. The Libraries' new digital collection of streamed movies/TV episodes and downloadable music also took off, with more than 8,000 selections checked out in the initial year.

The online homework-help service continues to be well used by students of all ages. In 2015, there were more than 114,000 sessions in which students accessed this online resource's real-time live tutoring, skill-building activities, writing lab, or test center.



Libraries have transformed from sedate institutions into creative and engaging



There are few individuals who are both highly accomplished and compassionate as Dr. Mary desVignes-Kendrick. Dr. desVignes-Kendrick currently serves as Director of Health and Human Services and Health Authority for Fort Bend County, which was named one of the fastest growing counties in the United States.

Her commitment to public health is evidenced by her long-standing work in academia, including her positions as a Professor of Epidemiology and Biostatistics at Texas A&M Health Science Center, and Professor of Management, Policy, and Community Health and Deputy Director at UT Center for Biosecurity and Public Health Preparedness in Houston Texas. Prior to her work in education, she also served as Director and Health Authority for the City of Houston Department of Health and Human Services, a position she held for 12 years under three Houston mayors.

Dr. desVignes-Kendrick's distinguished career began after completing her undergraduate degree at New York University, earning a medical degree from Meharry Medical College, and receiving a Master of Public Health degree from the UT School of Public Health in Houston, Texas. She is also board certified in pediatrics and is a Fellow of the American Academy of
