Healthy Competition at AccessHealth's Community Challenge Tournament Fort Bend ISD First in Texas to issue 'green bonds'



On Saturday, April 22nd, Commissioner Grady Prestage joined more than 100 softball and kickball players who fought hard for championship titles at AccessHealth's 5th Annual *Community Challenge* Tournament. Six softball teams and four kickball teams competed for bragging rights. Taking top honors in their brackets were: The City of Richmond in softball and Houston Methodist Sugar Land Hospital in kickball.

"Congratulations to Houston Methodist Sugar Land and the City of Richmond," said AccessHealth Chief Development Officer, Cindy Reaves. "Thank you to all who came out for what turned out to be a beautiful day for a little healthy competition!"

The event, held at Missouri City's Community Park, raised funds to provide integrated health services for the lowincome and uninsured in Fort Bend County and surrounding areas.

Sponsors included Houston Methodist Sugar Land Hospital as the "Challenge Champs Underwriter" and the City of Missouri City as the "Grand Slam" Sponsor. Also supporting the event were Community Health Choice as a "Home Run" Sponsor; M.D. Anderson Cancer Center and Health South Rehabilitation as "Umpire" Sponsors; and Schramme Construction and Frost Bank as "Dugout" Sponsors. As a part of the \$484 million bond package approved by the district's voters in 2014, FBISD will issue "green bonds" to fund environmentally friendly construction of three new schools. The district plans to roll out about \$99 million in bonds this month with about \$52 million designated as "green."

As a part of the program, the three new schools, Donald Leonetti Elementary School in the Sienna Plantation masterplanned community, James C. Neill Elementary in the Harvest Green master-planned community and James

Patterson Elementary in the Grand Vista subdivision will meet LEED/highperformance standards and obtain LEED certification.

It will be the first time in Texas a school district has issued green bonds. The University of Texas and other higher education institutions have also utilized this relatively new sector of the national municipal bond market to finance LEED-certified buildings. Started in 2007, green bonds make up only about 0.2 percent of the \$100 trillion global debt market. <u>Reuters reports</u> that, in 2016, the green bond market expanded by \$80 billion to about \$170 billion.

Fort Bend County Animal Services WARNS of Canine Distemper

Fort Bend County Animal Services is urging the public to be aware of the signs and symptoms of this potentially fatal disease



and what steps you can take to protect your pet. Canine distemper is a contagious and serious disease caused by a virus that attacks the respiratory, gastrointestinal and nervous systems of puppies and dogs.

Puppies and dogs most often become infected through airborne exposure (through sneezing or coughing) to the virus from an infected dog or wild animal. The virus can also be transmitted by shared food and water bowls and equipment. Infected dogs can shed the virus for months, and mother dogs can pass the virus to their puppies.

What are the symptoms of canine distemper? Initially, infected dogs will develop watery to pus-like discharge from their eyes. They then develop fever, nasal discharge, coughing, lethargy, reduced appetite, and vomiting. As the virus attacks the nervous system, infected dogs develop circling behavior, head tilt, muscle twitches, convulsions with jaw chewing movements and salivation ("chewing gum fits"), seizures, and partial or complete paralysis. tools.

"MS PowerPoint: Advanced," will take place on Thursday, May 11th, beginning at 10:00 am, in the Computer Lab. This class is for experienced PowerPoint users who would like to learn how to enhance documents with new, even more advanced skills, such as images editing, design themes editing, interactive elements, and options for slide organization.
