'The Grid' Breaks Ground in Stafford

Superstars Zapp, Cupid, Tucka



On Monday, September 24th, Commissioner Grady Prestage joined Stafford Mayor Leonard Scarcella, Dallasbased StreetLevel Investments and partner Provident Realty Advisors Inc. in Stafford to break ground on 'The Grid,' a new mixed-use project formerly home to Texas Instruments Inc.

Headline 2018 Community Night Out Festival

The musical stars will shine in Missouri City at the Third Annual Community Night Out festival on Saturday, Oct. 6th from 4pm to 10pm at the City Hall Complex, 1522 Texas Pkwy.

Legendary funk band, Zapp, will headline live concert performances with classic hits like "More Bounce to the Ounce" and other dance favorites.

Located at 12201 Southwest Freeway at the intersection of U.S. 69 and West Airport Boulevard, The Grid is a multiphase, \$500 million project on 192 acres with the first phase scheduled to open in 2019. In total, the mixed-use project will have 350,000 square feet of retail and restaurant space, 2,400 residential units, several hotels, a premier health club and luxury cinema. The project also calls for a food hall and community gathering area called The Lawn, a public space with live music, events, movie nights and art exhibits.



Developer Adam Schiller considers this a "billboard location" along the heavily traveled U.S. 69 corridor. "Everyone has to drive by this site to get to the Galleria, to see the Astros, the museums," said Schiller, managing principal of StreetLevel Investments. "Now we're going to give them a reason to stop, come in and spend their dollars."

Fort Bend County Health & Human Services has confirmed the presence of West Nile virus in a sample of trapped mosquitoes located near Staffordshire Road and 5th Street in Stafford, TX.

Fort Bend County Road & Bridge was notified of one sample of trapped mosquitoes that tested positive for West Nile virus (WNV). Standard response to prevent mosquito breeding in an area with a positive sample of mosquitoes consists of increased spraying and larviciding in the area until trapped mosquitoes test negative for the virus.

West Nile Virus can cause a potentially serious illness that spreads when infected mosquitoes bite humans and other animals. Symptoms include high fever, headaches, neck stiffness, nausea, and

vomiting. It is important to note that 80% of people infected with WNV will show no symptoms at all, and only 1 in 150 people infected with WNV will develop severe symptoms. Severe symptoms include fever, and may include unusually intense headaches or confusion. If these symptoms develop, seek medical attention immediately. Symptoms will appear 3-14 days after an infected mosquito has bitten a person.

"All residents, regardless of their location, should protect themselves and their families against mosquito bites. Mosquitoes carry many diseases that can cause serious illnesses," said Dr. desVignes-Kendrick, Local Health Authority and Director of Health & Human Services.

All county residents are encouraged to practice the 4D's:

- **DUSK/DAWN** are the times of day you should try to stay indoors. This is when infected mosquitoes are most active.
- **DRESS** in long sleeves and pants when you are outside. For extra protection, you may want to spray thin clothing with repellent.
- **DEET** (N, N-diethyl-m-toluamide) is an ingredient to look for in your insect repellent. Follow label instructions, and always wear repellent when outdoors. Reapply as you would with sunscreen, after sweating and swimming.
- **DRAIN** standing water in your backyard and neighborhood – old tires, flowerpots, and clogged rain gutters. These are mosquitobreeding sites.



Office of Emergency Management Wants YOU!

In the event of an area wide disaster, critical infrastructure and emergency services will be impacted. The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program trains residents to prepare for and respond to life-threatening events in their community.



Fort Bend County Office of Emergency Management (OEM) has its own organized CERT program. CERT members prepare, organize and work together as a team to provide essential services to their community during and after a disaster. CERTs' strengthen neighborhood resiliency and play a vital Fort Bend County Road and Bridge will continue to monitor mosquito samples for the presence of mosquito-borne diseases and provide control methods when they are found.
